Keeping Your Pet Safe During Cold Weather

Doggone Cold: Bundle up. Even a fur coat can't fully ward off the chill. Always provide a warm, dry place for your pet to sleep.

Tell-tail signs: It can be tricky to know whether a pet is cold, so keep a close eye on your pet when they play outside. Shivering and decreased activity are both signs of freezing. Redness on their extremities, such as the ears, mean they have been outside too long.

Icy Dangers: Antifreeze is poisonous! It is easy to clean up with cat litter. Pour it over any spills to soak up the liquid; then sweep up and dispose of it.

Melting products such as de-icers can irritate animal's skin or upset their stomach if ingested. Choose a pet-safe variety for outdoor walkways. Always wipe down your pet's paws and belly after walks to remove any chemicals on their fur.

Finders Keepers: Pets are more likely to get lost in the winter since snow masks smells that help them determine their surroundings. In addition to outfitting your dog or cat with an ID tag, consider having them microchipped. Permanent chip implants help shelters identify lost pets and match them to their owners; a chip can never fall off or go missing. This is a quick procedure that can be done at vet's office.




The question foremost in a dog owners mind is: “When is my canine ready for Doggie Obedience Class?” Here are some clues which might just help you decide.
