The Real Meaning of Christmas By Don and Lana Elmore

On Wednesday, November 30 while I was answering calls for Central Coast Humane Society, I received a call from a lady that turned out to be a very special person. She called and was desperately trying to find out if there was any help available for a little kitten she had just rescued. During our conversation, I learned the kitten had an injured back leg that would have to be amputated. The cost was going to be in the neighborhood of about a \$1000. She revealed that in the couple of days she had this kitten, she had fallen hopelessly in love with it. Their family decided they would give up having a Christmas tree, presents, and all that went with it, just to save this kitten!



Central Coast Humane Society committed the maximum they could of \$125 for the surgery, \$40 for neutering the kitten, and \$25 for a rabies vaccination. All of this was included in the original estimate. I contacted Oceanlake Vet to talk to them about the procedure. While I was on the phone, I found out that one of their clients had heard about the situation and personally committed \$200 towards the bill. I talked to my wife, and we decided that we would also help and pledged \$100. Upon future conversation with the veterinary office it was disclosed to me that Dr. Malter and her great staff would volunteer as much of their time and resources as possible. With all of this combined, the overall cost was reduced to the point where this special lady and her family could take on the remainder of the expenses.

The special person whom I am talking about is Nikki Wolfe. She is the one who rescued Molalla, the Christmas kitten. Nikki is one of our local teachers who works with special needs children. After Molalla's surgery and during recovery, Nikki took her to school several times. It turned out that these special children were great therapy for Molalla--and she was great for them also.

Molalla is now at home acting like any normal cat, running, jumping, and playing.

The main point of this story is it began with a special lady falling in love with a kitten who needed help. She wanted to give it a good home. Thanks to everyone who made this happen--to our local vet and staff, to perfect strangers in our community, and to all who give to CCHS so that we may help. And most of all THANK YOU, NIKKI, and family.


Amazing Animal Facts, Part 1

Pet Quick Facts 2017

Cats are by far the most popular pet in the United States. There are over 80 million of them in our homes. There are also about 50 million unowned cats living amongst us.

The second most popular pet is the Dog with about 74 million of them in our homes.

About 35 to 45 % of all households own a dog and 30 to 37% own a cat. About 65% of all US households own a pet or about 80 million families.

Domestic cats can run at an average speed of 30 miles per hour for short spurts. Dogs can run on average 20 miles per hour for short spurts.
